The new isolation guidance for symptomatic children and adults is as follows: Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature. 			If a child or young person has a positive COVID-19 test result they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test, if they can. If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

Anyone identified as a close contact of a school case should undertake a PCR test, if pupils have no signs of symptoms they can attend school while awaiting results. On return to school pupils over the age of 5 should continue to carry out daily lateral flow testing for 7 days, only attending school if the test result is negative.

Children under 5 years old who are identified as close contacts will only be advised to take a PCR test if the positive case is in their own household.

Text Added:. The new isolation guidance for symptomatic children and adults is as follows: Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature. Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.

Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice is 3 days.

Although the majority of measures have now been removed there are still a number of preventative measures which settings can maintain including: Ensure good hygiene for everyone; Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes; Keeping occupied spaces well ventilated.

Anyone aged 5 years and over who lives in the same household as someone with COVID-19 and who is not legally required to self-isolate is now strongly advised to take an LFD test every day for 7 days. If any of these LFD tests are positive they should self-isolate in order to protect other people. The public health advice for people with symptoms of, or a positive test result for COVID-19 remains the same for everyone.

Anyone, including staff and pupils, who now receives a positive lateral flow test but has no COVID-19 symptoms will no longer have to take a PCR to confirm the result. This will be effective from Tuesday 11 January.

People who live in the same household as someone with COVID-19 are at the highest risk of becoming infected because they are most likely to have prolonged close contact. People who stayed overnight in the household of someone with COVID-19 while they were infectious are also at high risk.

If you are a household or overnight contact of someone who has had a positive COVID -19 test result it can take up to 10 days for your infection to develop. It is possible to pass on COVID-19 to others, even if you have no symptoms.

You can reduce the risk to other people by taking the following steps:

- avoid contact with anyone you know who is at <u>higher risk of becoming severely unwell</u> if they are infected with COVID-19, especially <u>those whose immune system means they are at higher risk of serious illness from COVID-19</u>, despite vaccination
- limit close contact with other people outside your household, especially in crowded, enclosed or poorly ventilated spaces
- wear a well-fitting face covering made with multiple layers or a surgical face mask if you do need to have close contact with other people, or you are in a crowded place
- wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use hand sanitiser

If you develop symptoms of a respiratory infection try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people and follow the guidance for people with symptoms.

If you are a contact of someone with COVID-19 but do not live with them or did not stay in their household overnight, you are at lower risk of becoming infected. There is <u>guidance on protecting yourself and others in living safely with respiratory infections, including COVID-19</u>.

Text deleted: Close contacts or household members of a positive case of the **Omicron** variant of COVID-19 must self-isolate (as instructed by NHS Test and Trace or their local health protection team) and book a PCR test. Otherwise, for other variants, close contacts **don't** need to self-isolate if any of the following applies:

- They're fully vaccinated
- They're below the age of 18 years and 6 months
- They've taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial
- They're not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons

Instead, they'll be advised by NHS Test and Trace to take a PCR test.

From 14 December 2021, adults who are fully vaccinated and all children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years and 6 months identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 are strongly advised to take a LFD test every day for 7 days and continue to attend their setting as normal, unless they have a positive test result.

Daily testing of close contacts applies to all contacts who are:

- fully vaccinated adults people who have had 2 doses of an approved vaccine
- all children and young people aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, regardless of their vaccination status
- people who are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons
- people taking part, or have taken part, in an approved clinical trial for a COVID-19 vaccine

Children under 5 years are exempt from self-isolation and do not need to take part in daily testing of close contacts.

If a staff member or pupil has a positive PCR test, Head Teacher will carry out a risk assessment and identify all those who have been in close contact with the affected case. They will be advised to follow government guidance and will receive a "warn and inform" letter to alert parents that their child is a close contact and to follow advice on testing.

With effect from week commencing 25th January 2021 all school staff will have the opportunity to complete lateral flow tests twice weekly, 3-4 days apart. Staff will be provided with lateral flow devices and instructed to complete the tests at home prior to attending school. Staff are requested to inform both school and NHS T and Trace of their results. If the result is positive staff will isolate, arrange a PCR test and follow school procedure.

Head teachers to implement arrangements to minimise members of the public accessing buildings where possible.

Reduce mixing between year groups and classes as much as possible to reduce the risk of transmission of Covid-19, including

wherever possible, suspending whole-school or year group events, for example assemblies and staggering breaks and lunchtimes.

A 'bubble' system will be reintroduced where possible. Classroom layout will be reviewed where possible to minimise configurations where students are facing each other in favour of rows of desks to face the front. When members of the public have to access buildings, arrangements to be in place to ensure entry is by appointment only in order to manage social distancing requirements. Only one person (plus accompanying child) allowed entry into the main

office reception area at any one time. Adult visitors including parents must wear face coverings on entry and follow sanitising

Nominated staff to carry out deep clean of potentially contaminated areas within the school and follow risk assessment guidance associated with cleaning materials used.

Head teacher to ensure relevant areas are kept clear until areas have been cleaned with disinfectant. Workstation of confirmed case to be cleaned as above and quarantined for 72 hours, so far as is reasonably practicable.

On completion of cleaning tasks remove PPE in this order:

- 1. Remove gloves and sanitise hands.
- 2. Remove apron & eye protection and sanitise hands
- 3. Remove mask and sanitise hands

Dispose of PPE into bin bag and tie, then double bag and tie again. Dispose of after 72 hours.

- Stagger drop-off and collection times.

Plan parents' drop-off and pick-up protocols that minimise adult to adult contact.

Childcare settings or early years groups in school should:

- Consider how to keep small groups of children together throughout the day and to avoid larger groups of children mixing wherever possible.
- Staff are aware that early years children have a lesser understanding of social distancing though they will make their best endeavours to encourage this.

Consider how play equipment is used ensuring it is appropriately disinfected between groups of children using it, and that multiple groups do not use it simultaneously.

If government roadmap runs to schedule with effect from w/c 7th June 2021:

- soft furnishings, soft toys and toys that are hard to clean (such as those with intricate parts) will be sanitised and gradually reintroduced into the classroom;
- ocarina & recorder lessons will be introduced. Instruments will be thoroughly cleaned after use. All children will face the same direction and windows will be open.

Consider how children and young people arrive at the education or childcare setting, and reduce any unnecessary travel on coaches, buses or public transport where possible. Read the <u>Coronavirus (COVID-19): safer travel guidance for passengers</u>.

System of controls

This is the set of actions schools must take. They are grouped into 'prevention' and 'response to any infection' and are outlined in more detail in the sections below.

Prevention

You must always:

- Minimise contact with individuals who are required to self-isolate by ensuring they do not attend the school.
- Ensure face coverings are used in recommended circumstances.
- Ensure everyone is advised to clean their hands thoroughly and more often than usual.
- Ensure good respiratory hygiene for everyone by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.
- Maintain enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents.
- Consider how to minimise contact across the site and maintain social distancing wherever possible.
- Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.

In specific circumstances:

- Ensure individuals wear the appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) where necessary.
- 9) Promote and engage in asymptomatic testing, where available.

Response to any infection

You must always:

- Promote and engage with the NHS Test and Trace process.
- Manage and report confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community.
- 12) Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice.
